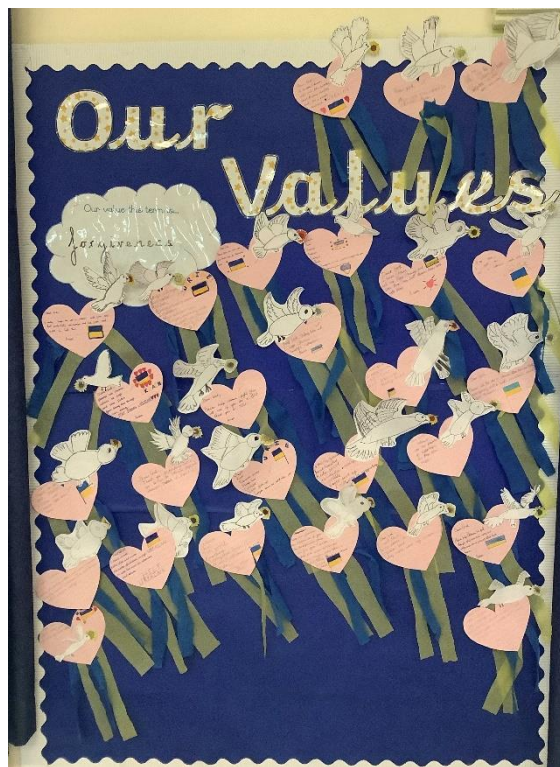

Science Week & STEM Fair

This term we took part in Science Week (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) Fair. To celebrate, we conducted experiments in our house teams, created our own experiments for the STEM Fair and had guest scientists talk to us about careers in STEM!

Mrs Breen led some excellent investigations with skittles. Using skittles and warm water, the children discovered that the different chemical properties of the food dyes in the skittles meant that initially, as the colours dissolved, they did not mix together. This resulted in some beautiful sweet art!



Mrs Weston worked on an engineering project with the children, creating puff powered rockets! The children were absolutely thrilled with their air power creations.



Mrs Anderson helped the children to investigate alien solutions. Different materials were mixed together into an alien soup and the children had to work together to separate the solids from the liquids, the magnetic materials from the non-magnetic materials and consider how to remove materials once they have dissolved into a solution. Some excellent messy science!



On Friday, the Science Week continued, with bird box building and bug hunting in Amazon Class. Working in groups with adult support, the children used hammers and nails to secure together untreated wood to make sparrow boxes. After building bird boxes, they went bug hunting using our new bug collectors. The children had a great time magnifying minibeasts and identifying the species. Thank you to Mr Cole for supplying the bird box kits.



In the afternoon, the whole school came together for the STEM Fair - a chance for children to showcase their own experiments. There were volcanoes, trash fashion, grown crystals, games, rockets, cars and many, many more experiments! We also had guest talks from Alison Nightingale, an epidemiologists who now works with the MOD and submarine data analysis and also Dr Parimala Shivaprasad, who researched different ways to reduce waste and has created a business around reusing waste flowers for essential oils.



At the end of the fair, it was time to announce our winners. Congratulations to:

Amazon Class Update



During Term 4, Amazon Class have continued their exploration of our wonderful world, trekking across the globe to Africa! We've been on a virtual safari, focusing in on the country of Kenya. We have explored the scorching climate, the different landscapes and the safari animals that inhabit the savannah.

The children have been immersed in African culture, creating vibrant African artwork, following the beat with some traditional African drumming and sampling some flamboyant African dance. We reflected on the importance of Fairtrade produce, learnt about how chocolate is grown on Fairtrade farms in Ghana and how to look for the Fairtrade logo, before making our very own Fairtrade brownies.

We have explored the super story of Meerkat Mail, learning more about meerkats found in the African desert and writing postcards which we sent to Mrs Boddington in Africa. We have asked her lots of questions about meerkats and sampled some dried mango she sent over from Africa!

We have also learnt the story of Lila and the Rain, learning new vocabulary such as scorching, sweltering, arid, dehydrated, wilting, ebony and awash to name just a few! We focused on the techniques used by the author to bring the story to life and then became authors ourselves to rewrite this wonderful story of hope.

To really bring our topic to life, we went on our own safari adventure to Cotswold Wildlife Park where we met many fascinating animals and enjoyed a zookeeper talk all about the King of the Savannah- the lion.

And if all of this wasn't enough to keep us busy, we have shown true determination throughout March to complete our 100 Miles in March challenge to raise money for WWF and save many of the animals we have been learning about this term. A huge thank you to everyone who donated to this cause and supported our exhausting efforts. So far we have raised a fantastic £203!

It's been another busy and exciting term's learning in Rhine Class. Our topic 'Flight' saw us travel to the Hawk Conservancy Trust. We were treated to a thrilling World Birds of Prey flying display, with a fun but informative commentary explaining what the birds were doing and why. Being able to see the birds swoop down close to your head was a thoroughly engaging and memorable experience. We were also fortunate to have



had a visit from Mr Cole, who came to demonstrate and explain how he uses a drone at work.

We have enjoyed reading our class book 'Skellig' by David Almond and poetry by William Blake. This inspired the children to write their own poems based on Tyger, Tyger, which have been published in a class book.

We explored many of the themes in Skellig including: wings, flying and angels. The children thought about what they would do if they could fly, learnt about owls and made their own Angel out of Clay after looking at Anthony Gormley's famous sculpture – The Angel of the North.



We had great fun celebrating, "poisson d'avril" (April Fish) which is the name for April Fools' Day in France. It is a day when children try to hook paper fish on the back of unwary victims and when found they shout out 'poisson d'avril!'

Also this term the year 6 children took part in Bikeability, gaining practical skills and understanding how to cycle on today's roads.
